This month shall be the beginning of months for you; it is to be the first month of the year to you. (Exodus 12:2)



Dear Friends,

As we are preparing to carry out our first Barley Inspection of the season in just a few weeks, we thought this would be a good opportunity to respond to your questions about whether we should be looking at planted or volunteer fields.

To remind you, a planted field is one in which the soil is tilled (this breaks up crusted soil, mixes organic matter into the soil, and helps control weeds), the crop is planted (this prevents the stalks from growing closely together and being suffocated), and the crop is rotated (this

prevents the soil from inevitably losing the nutrients the crop needs). Prepping the soil also makes the soil able to absorb the rainfall, so the stalks can use it to produce full healthy seeds. And the fields mature pretty uniformly, and the heads don't easily break, which makes the crop harvestable.

In contrast, there are what are referred to as volunteer fields. These are fields which no one asked the barley to grow there, so the soil isn't prepped, and the seeds aren't planted. Rather it grows there voluntarily, because barley is an annual crop, which means it reproduces and germinates on its own each year. Because the soil isn't prepped and the seeds aren't planted, the barley in a volunteer field is growing in an environment which is not very conducive, and as a result the barley becomes very stressed, and tries to develop and produce seed very quickly. This is why the stalks in a volunteer field are very thin, and seeds very flat, and they often dry out before they have finished developing. This is also the reason one finds extreme differences of maturity in different patches of the field, and the heads break very easily, and the field eventually gets overtaken by oats, flowers, and other weeds. This is why a volunteer field can't be harvested, and why the Bedouins opt instead to bring their sheep to graze on the free pasture.

So, do you think we should be looking at planted or volunteer fields to determine the beginning of the year? It seems to me that we are supposed to determine the beginning of the year based on planted fields, that produce a healthy crop, that can be harvested when it's ready, and can sustain a nation (Gen 3:19, Ex 23:10, Ex 23:16, Lev 23:10, Lev 23:14, Joshua 5:12).

Ona side note, a question which often arises related to volunteer fields, is whether an Omer of Aviv Barley is enough to begin the year. The question arises because it can be possible to find a patch of barley which looks very developed, in an otherwise underdeveloped field, this is because the patch is actually just extremely stressed.

I also think it's important to remember that the Omer isn't a standalone thing, rather it's taken from the harvest (Lev 23:10, Lev 23:14), and that Chodesh HaAviv (Month of the Aviv), is

the month in which the barley fields (not a patch) are harvest-ready, meaning a plague of hail would be devastating (Ex 9:31) and it can feed a small nation (Joshua 5:10-12).

As for our upcoming Barley Inspection(s), it's still raining and very cold here, and the barley heads are only in the very beginning stages of their development. Therefore, our first official Barley Inspection of the season, is currently scheduled for just prior to the New Moon Observation of March 11, 2024, and we could really use your prayers and support to ensure its success.
